USCSA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS AT SUGARLOAF: MARCH 1-6

By the time this newsletter reaches the hands of the members, the USCSA (United States Collegiate Ski and Snowboard Association) national skiing and snowboard championships will be concluded; they were held between March 1 and March 6 at Sugarloaf. Alpine events in slalom and giant slalom; cross country events including 8.5 K Freestyle, 3 x 5K Relay, and 15 K Classic; and snowboard events including half-pipe and parallel giant slalom comprised the array of competitions for both men and women.

Athletes from 54 different schools and 20 different states competed; 370 men and women participated. In the USCSA, generally athletes come as part of a college team that has qualified, rather than qualifying as individuals although a few individual competitors do attend. The USCSA includes geographic diversity as broad as California State University at Long Beach, Virginia Tech, the University of Toledo, and Brown University. Representation is also diverse; some schools sent only alpine competitors, some only cross country, some only snowboard, and some sent combinations of the above.

There were several local students involved in the competitions. CVA graduates included Garret Lashar, Kara Hoisington, and Rachel Coffin. Formerly from the SCVA weekend programs— Kristina Hoch, Brent Shannon, and Matt Bailey competed also.



SPRING

In the "old days" when spring came and the wooden skis were put away, some pretty interesting rituals had to occur. One "blocked the skis" but putting a piece of wood between them at the waist and strapping the tips and tails together. That was supposed to preserve the camber. They were also hung by the tails, because if the skis were just left leaning at a strange angle, they might become warped. Leather boots had to be nice and dry, perhaps stuffed with newspaper to absorb moisture and keep the shape (and maybe keep the mice out).

be as simple as getting the rust off the
edges, putting some
wax on to protect
the bases, and drying the inside of the
boots and buckling them up.

Many of our readers may be more familiar with the NCAA Division I schools which include the Universities of Vermont and New Hampshire, Dartmouth and Middlebury, Colby, Bates, among other eastern teams, as well as such western powerhouse teams as the Universities of Colorado, New Mexico, Denver. In contrast, the National Collegiate Athletic Association competitors do qualify as individuals for the NCAA national championships—to be held at Sugar Bowl, California, hosted by the University of Nevada this year.

Recipe for Quick, Cheap, Easy Fondue!

(Made by Nancy Holliday for the Annual Meeting and printed here by request)


About 1 1/4 to 1 1/3 pound swiss cheese (cubed or grated)

1 1/2 cup cheap white wine

1 Tbsp lemon juice

3 Tbsp flour nutmeg and cayenne pepper to taste clove of garlic

Rub the inside of the fondue pot with the peeled clove of garlic. Add the wine and lemon juice and heat to just below boiling. Toss the cheese with the flour and add to the fondue pot. Stir, stir, stir until it comes to a boil, adding the seasonings at some time during the melting process. Get the bread cubes out and enjoy!


