Special Meeting called for Ski Club Members

By call of the Board of Directors of the Sugarloaf Mountain Ski Club, a Special Meeting of the Sugarloaf Mountain Ski Club Members shall be held on October 7 at 4:00 pm in the Bill and Joan Alfond Competition Center, just prior to the Ski Club's Member Homecoming social event. The purpose of the meeting shall be to vote upon an Agreement and Plan of Consolidation under which the Ski Club and the Sugarloaf Regional Ski Educational Foundation (SRSEF) shall combine together to become one corporation. Application will be made to the Internal

Revenue Service for approval of the combined entity as exempt from taxation, and a determination that donations to the combined organization would be deductible for income tax purposes as a so called 501(c)(3) organization.

Over the years there has been confusion regarding the Ski Club and SRSEF as to their separate missions and also as to the deductibility of donations to each. As part of the Consolidation, a new set of bylaws will be adopted to clarify and update them to more modern standards.

A copy of the Agreement and Plan of Consolidation and the new Bylaws can be found on the Ski Club website, and will be available at the Special Meeting as well. ▲

When the club was founded in 1950, it did not apply for tax-exempt status. In 1968, the club formed the Sugarloaf Regional Ski Educational Foundation, which is a tax-exempt organization. The purpose of this at the time was to run the junior competition programs, and to be able to receive tax deductible contributions. Now that the Bill & Joan Alford Competition Center is complete, a project for which we had been saving money for many years, your club is going to focus on building up our scholarship programs so that kids from this area and beyond will have more opportunity to ski and ride on this

mountain we all love so much. Your board decided we could do this more efficiently with one tax-exempt organization, so we formulated a plan to create a new entity by combining SSC and SRSEF resources.

During Homecoming Weekend, on Saturday, October 7, at 4:00 p.m., a meeting for all members is scheduled in the Alford Competition Center. Greg Foster will present a plan for combining SSC and SRSEF, and a resolution will be put forth for a vote by members of the club. I hope many of you can attend. After the meeting, we will have a reception for members, and then from 5:30 – 7:00 we will have a Shepherd's Pie supper prepared by club mem-

Laurel DesRoches Lashar Named to Gould Academy Athletic Hall of Fame

Raised at Laurel Mountain in Ligonier, PA, Laurel DesRoches started skiing at the young age of eighteen months. Fast forward to 1963, with a few years under her belt and more than a few trophies and ribbons, she placed 3rd in the Women's Combined North American Alpine Championships at Stowe.

In the fall of 1963, Laurel came to Gould Academy, playing field hockey and tennis, but her main focus was skiing, and she served as captain of the girls' ski team her senior year. Laurel became the Maine Girls Skimeister and competed in junior nationals in both her junior and senior years. Laurel also served on the Executive Council of the Gould Outing Club.

Then for one year Laurel skied for the University of Colorado, before transferring to Johnson State College, where there was no existing women's ski team. By accepting her coach's challenge to win a college race she helped start a women's team. Besides skiing for her college team, Laurel also competed as an individual racing for the U.S. Ski Team.

Since college, her dedication and commitment to the sport fueled her drive to coach, and to administer hundreds of races.

Laurel returned to Maine in 1997, making Sugarloaf her home. She has been Sugarloaf's race administrator and official timer from 2000 through the present, and also serves as Executive Director of MARA, the Maine Alpine Racing Association. Her efforts have earned her the prestigious Sugarloaf President's Award for outstanding service. ▲

Three Sugarloaf Ski Club members lead 2017 Maine Ski Hall of Fame Class

When skiers gather at Sunday River on October 28 to honor this year's class of inductees, three of the eight will be Sugarloaf Ski Club members. Bruce Miles, Karen Hunter Korn and Chip Cochrane made their mark on Maine skiing in different ways: Bruce as an instructor, coach and official, with his greatest impact as a fund raiser; Karen as a freestyle champion; and Chip as an outstanding downhill racer and a coach. Their impact has gone well beyond Sugarloaf, and all three are important figures on today's Sugarloaf scene.

Karen Hunter Korn

Growing up in Bangor, Karen Hunter joined the Sugarloaf freestyle program in 1975-76 at age nine and began competing in local competitions. Success followed quickly, as she

won at the J-II Combined Championship in 1981: 1st in Ballet, 1st in Moguls, 4th in Aerials, and 8th in Overall Combined at age 14. From 1983 to 1993 Hunter was a leading freestyle contender as a

member of three World Championship Teams. In her five seasons on the U.S. World Cup Team Karen achieved 5 Podiums, 12 top five finishes and 28 top ten finishes.



Chip Cochrane

After turning in a 15th place finish in his first FIS Can-Am (now Nor-Am) Downhill at Sugarloaf at age 15, Chip Cochrane moved quickly up the ladder. He raced Europa Cup in 1976-77, earning a spot on the U.S. Ski Team's Development Team in 1978. In 1981 he raced on the World Cup circuit. Following an injury, Chip turned to coaching, and has an impressive history of turning out successful racers at CVA, racers such as Bode Miller, Kirsten Clark and Forest Carey.

Bruce Miles

After beginning to teach skiing at Sugarloaf in 1968, Bruce Miles quickly earned PSIA certification in 1970, went on to train






