The Sugarloaf Outdoor Center is preparing for another exciting season with opening day scheduled for November 27.

Season passes are still available and taxpayers may still enjoy reduced rates. Property owner fees for 2004/2005 are \$175/ adult and \$125/ JR (6-12) and SR (60+). As in past years, season pass holders may enjoy New England's longest ski season and unlimited skating on the outside rink.


A full calendar of events and programs is scheduled for 2004/2005. Guided snowshoe tours, family skating parties, and our popular Junior and Adult Hockey programs will be held weekly from late December through mid March. Highlighting the event calendar this season is the first annual Banknorth Sugarloaf Ski Marathon, a 50 Km/25 Km freestyle race and tour for skiers of all abilities, the second race in the prestigious New England Marathon Series. A variety of volunteer opportunities are available to ski club members and their friends at all events. Benefits include one alpine lift ticket voucher for each full day worked. Who Are Those CVA Kids

You see them climbing off the CVA buses in the Sugarloaf parking lot as they take to the mountain to train carrying their skis and snowboards. As they unload you may ask: "Where do they come from? How many student-athletes attend CVA? When do they find time to study? Wouldn't it be fun to ski or ride everyday?" Here are answers to those and other questions:

How many CVA student-athletes are there?

A total of 115 student-arhietes are enrolled for the 2004-2005 school year. Nincty-two of these student-arhietes attend CVA for the full school year and the balance of the kids are enrolled for seven or five months. Eighty student-arhietes live in the dormitories and 35 are day student-arhietes fiving with their parents in the local area of Carrabassett Valley.

Where do they come from?

Fifteen of CVA's student-athletes live in Carrabassett Valley, another 30 come from other parts of Maine and 24 live in other New England states. The remaining student-athletes come from Pennsylvania, North Carolina, New York, New Jersey, Virginia and Minnesota. CVA also has student-athletes from Canada, Germany and Japan.

What grades are they in?

Currently there are 10 eighth graders, 30 freshman, 16 sophomores, 23 paniors, 35 semors and 1 post-graduate.

How many snowboarders, skiers?

This year 12 CVA student-athletes are part of the ALPS program, 37 are alpine racers, 40 are freestyle and 27 snowboard.

Are they all privileged kids?

All CVA student-athletes are privileged in that they are able to attend CVA either by their own accord or with assistance from financial aid. This year 33% of CVA student-athletes received financial aid. CVA depends on fundraising efforts each year for the money awarded in financial aid. Events, such as the CVA/Sugarloaf Golf Classic, Big Raffle Silent & Live Auction and the CVA Triathlon, as well as the Annual Fund, are the primary sources of these funds.

What's ALPS?

ALPS combines the college-preparatory academics of CVA with teaching of outdoor skills critical to big mountain skiing and riding on the mountains of Maine and regions around the globe. Bi-annual destinations have included France, New Zealand, and Chile for one-month periods of travel, which enables total cultural immersion. The ALPS program uses physical and educational expeditions to tap the potential of student-athletes. Student-athletes develop as leaders who are skilled in communication, problem solving, and teamwork. ALPS student-athletes acquire self-confidence and deepen their sense of responsibility. Their personal limits are discovered and surpassed. ALPS student-athletes become outdoor explorers, critical thinkers, and seasoned leaders.

How did CVA Begin?

CVA began in 1969 in the basement of the Richard Bell Chapet with a handful of student-athletes as the Sugarloaf Regional Ski Educational Foundation (SRSEF) to help racers and freestylers sharpen their skills for competitive skiing. The success of SRSEF's tutorial program sparked a vision for establishing a ski academy at Sugarloaf in order to allow young athletes to stay in the Western Mountains of Maine rather than attend ski academies out of state. In the winter of 1982-1983, spurred by visionary H. King Cummings and other enthusiastic pioneers, CVA opened its doors for the first time as a five-month, winter-term tutorial program. CVA's charge was to develop a school for student-athletes based on the Greek ideal of developing equally the body, mind, and spirit. With its initial 15 student-athletes, the program was designed to provide young athletes with a high quality college-preparatory academic program while allowing for and emphasizing time on the mountain. The following year CVA relocated to the former Capricorn Lodge, where it remains housed today, as a full-time ski academy and college preparatory program.

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When do they study?

During the ski season CVA student-athletes attend their morning classes five days a week from 7:30 to 9:30, from 10:00 to 2:00 they ski, and then have afternoon classes from 3:30 to 5:30. After dinner there is a two-hour study hall. In the fall and spring terms classes are held six days a week. Mondays are a full academic day for CVA student-athletes, there are no athletics and they attend all seven classes.

What colleges do CVA student-athletes attend?

The success of CVA's rigorous college preparatory program has earned CVA student-athletes acceptance into the finest colleges. A sample of some of the schools include: Bates, Bowdoin, Colby, University of Maine, Williams, Middlebury, Clarkson, Boston College, Boston University, Dartmouth, Stanford, MIT, University of New Hampshire, University of Vermont, Colorado College, St. Lawrence University, Hamilton, Union, and Brown University.


What did Ski Club Members Do in Carrabassett Valley this Summer ??
