

Judson's - The End Of An Era

In October, shortly after Homecoming, Judson's Sugarloaf Motel was torn down.

The motel, which opened in the spring of 1958, was the last of the three original "Valley" ski lodges to come down. The Chateau des Tagues came down in 2014 and the Red Stallion in 20013.

The Sugarloaf Motel was built and operated by Irv and Edna "Ma" Judson. Before coming to Sugarloaf they had operated a

hotel called the Judson House in Unity, Maine. They operated the Sugarloaf Motel through the late 1960's together; then Irv passed away, and Ma Judson continued to operate the motel and restaurant. Ma Judson had a reputation for serving home cooked meals in a pleasant

family atmosphere. The motel restaurant boasted knotty pine walls and a very large fieldstone fireplace, which separated the dining room from









New Comp Center Update

The Annual Meeting held in 1954 at the newly expanded clubhouse. This was the meeting where the Sugarloaf Ski Club discussed issuing stock and forming the Sugarloaf Mountain Corporation. On March 24, 1955, the corporation was formed and Sugarloaf Ski Club received 10% of the common stock issued as compensation for all the facilities they had built. Ski Club President Robert Bass became the first president of the corporation. The first T-bar and new lodge were ready for the '55-'56 season.




Until December 17th, it will cost just \$30-\$35 per night to stay at a Hut. This is self-service season, so you'll need to pack in and pack out all



Camp Woodward, Pennsylvania


